## **LAZY DAZE PANCAKE BREAKFAST**

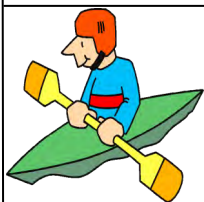

The 2018 TW kayaking season is about to begin. If you enjoy canoeing or kayaking or would like to just give it a try, please join us. 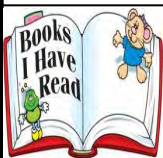

## BOOK CLUB

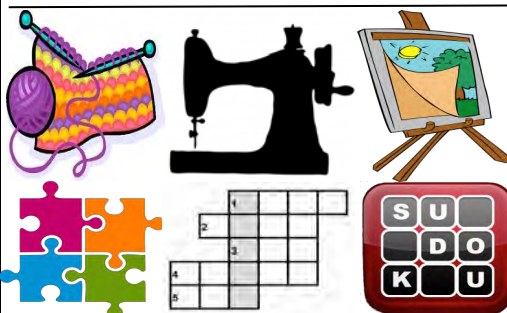

## CALLING ALL WRITERS!



### A REMARKABLE WOMAN

While this is not a Christmas story, it is a cause for celebration. It is a story of love, faith, determination, and delivery. It began with the tiniest of signs, just a small blemish on the back of Susie Hale's left arm. The man she calls her copilot, Terry, insisted that she get it tested. She leads a busy life and ignored his advice until the blemish grew and had a markedly different center. Amazingly, Susie did not act immediately, although she had survived kidney cancer in 2014.

Her first appointment was with her plastic surgeon where she learned that she would need to see a melanoma specialist. This physician discovered that her liver enzymes were elevated delaying the necessary surgeries. Soon after, she had a mammogram, the results of which revealed something suspicious. She endured two breast needle biopsies and found that she would have to undergo surgery. The recommendation was for total mastectomy but Susie was not ready for such a drastic fix. The surgeons performed a partial mastectomy revealing more cancer cells and even had to remove a lymph node. Not long after that, the recommendation for a total mastectomy was repeated, but Susie was still not yet ready. After the second partial mastectomy, the surgeons broke the news that the breast was full of cancer. By then, Susie accepted that was the only way to remove the cancer.

Of course, there remained the problem that initiated the discovery, the melanoma. The liver enzyme diagnosis put that on hold for a bit. Once the breast cancer was taken care of, she was sent to a dermatologist and an oncologist. Their examination revealed that in addition to the original melanoma, Susie had 30 more precancerous basal cells that needed to be removed. They extended from the top of her head to the bottom of her feet. These were removed by burning with the last of them removed at an 8:30 am appointment on November 20, 2017. No sooner were they scraped off, Susie and Terry were on their way home to Tangerine Woods. Her biggest fear was missing the winter season here. During the entire ordeal, her focus was on getting to TW.

The diagnosis of breast cancer was only the beginning of a long ordeal of poking, needles, biopsies, surgeries, scary consultations and much pain, physically and emotionally. She was sustained throughout by her faith, her loving partner Terry, and her best friend Marian Cole. Susie's first appointment on July 1, 2017, began a grueling test of strength for her, but she never lost faith that God had his hands on her. That faith has continued through her ongoing breast reconstruction surgeries and resulting diagnosis that she is cancer-free and didn't need chemo or radiation. Susie is convinced that her diagnosis and recovery are a Testimonial to God. As a footnote to her survival, Susie would like to advise everyone to check your bodies. If you cannot see every bit of skin on your own

body, have your mate or best friend check you for anything that might be suspicious and do the same for them. This is especially important to those of us who are sun worshippers. Editor's note: Thank you so much to Susie for sharing her brave story, and to LeeAnn for writing it so beautifully. You women inspire me every single day.

### Englewood Food Pantry

Welcome to you snowbirds who arrived after the Holidays, and also to our new owners and renters. TW is now supporting the efforts of the Jubilee Center/Englewood Food Pantry—thank you so much. We distribute food and toiletries to people in need and to the homeless in our community twelve months a year. If you would like to contribute to this ongoing charitable work, a large basket is located in the card room. People frequently ask me, "What do you need?" A box for a needy family frequently contains: cereal, peanut butter, jelly, canned vegetables, tuna fish, canned fruit, macaroni and cheese, pasta, spaghetti sauce, dried mashed potato mix, soup, rice, condiments (ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, oil, salad dressings, olives, pickles, etc.), toilet paper and paper towels. They also receive toothpaste, toothbrushes, razors, lotion and shampoo. Publix supplies us with the bakery items and people will drop off frozen meats (hams, chicken, turkey, hamburger.) The Homeless Hygiene Bags contain mostly sample/travel size items: a washcloth, soap, travel-size deodorants, comb, razor, toothbrush, toothpaste, lotion, chapstick, shampoo. Right now, we really need travel-size deodorants, chapsticks and washcloths. It goes without saying, if anyone would like to volunteer, we would love to have you. The Jubilee Center at St. David's Episcopal Church is open from 10-12 Monday through Thursday; volunteers usually arrive at 9:30 am. Give me a call at 941-716-9042 if you would like to help.

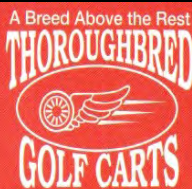

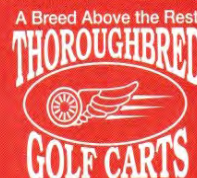

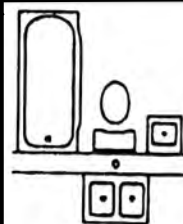
