Hello Friends and Neighbors! We at Lazy Daze are working every week to continue to maintain our great community. Before too long many of us will return to our summer homes. So, you will start to see a reduction in forces the next 4-5 weeks. I still have a few crews to introduce, so let's get started. Our golf cart maintenance crew is responsible for keeping our fleet in running order. Bob Wright and Karl Mortensen work tirelessly on a daily basis repairing our carts. Their job is not just on Mondays, they work all week diagnosing problems, ordering parts, charging the carts and keeping our equipment running. We all owe them a debt of gratitude for a job well done.

I would now like to introduce the lakes crew which is spearheaded by crew chief Karl Spandau. Joining Karl is Captain Mike Kraft, First Mate Ric Markley and Second Mate Tom Jackson. This crew has worked together for four years and are definitely our unsung heroes! Their primary responsibility is to maintain the lake aerators. This entails rebuilding the air pumps, installing them, and keeping the submerged air lines in working order.

These men work with a lake management company that controls weeds and algae in the lakes and monitors the condition of the water. Last fall we had a faulty aerator hose, so the crew set out in the TW lake's boat and used a grappling hook to locate the hose and bring it to the surface. The hose had been chewed through at one point and tooth marks were along the length of the hose.

Apparently we had a "bored" alligator! The hose was repaired and replaced. The next day upon inspection the hose was chewed through again so Captain Kraft and First Mate Markley found the break while mates Spandau and Jackson assisted from the safe shoreline. After completion the crew had the "Gator Guy" called and the rest is history.

This is just a fraction of the work the lakes crew does, but I want everyone to know how valuable they are.

DID YOU KNOW

Remember that you are in a condominium community and all communities of this type have rules to be followed for the exterior of your unit. Be sure to check for a rule on what you plan to do to the exterior of your unit.

As you know, many residents are having changes made to their units. But remember construction work hours are limited from 8:00 a.m. to sunset. That means that the owner is responsible for informing the construction company of this rule and that everyone will be considerate of their neighbors. REMEMBER: the Board has the right to reject any exterior plan. New precedents are not accepted readily.

Trees and flowerbeds need to be approved by the exterior committee. Article B6 gives all of the specifics. Be sure to check these 6 items before making your decision.

Did you know that your street lamp and post are the responsibility of the homeowner? The lamppost takes in the globe, the light bulb, the electricity to it, the wood or pvc of it, and how you keep the ground around it. The association has the right to remind you to change any part of it and pay for none of it. There is a dog park on San Casa where your dog can run and mingle with other dogs. You will need to pick up after it there too.

Did you know that your trash is not to be out before dusk the day before collection day? That means not 3 days before or even at 3 p.m.

That there are to be no fences of any kind. Does that mean a bushes fence too?

You know the winter season is almost over. Thank heavens and pray we have a good summer season (no severe storms), you stay healthy, and that those controlling our lives hand the control back to us, the responsible and common sense people.



PET RESPONSIBILITY

For those of you who are ignoring or flouting your responsibility to your

neighbors and your pet, be aware that it is a law of the state that you pick up your pet's waste. It is not only a rule of our community, it is a **LAW**. Should the culprits be observed and reported to the authorities, substantial fines will be imposed by the governing authority. So, take responsibility for your pet and clean up after it. Not only is your irresponsible behavior illegal, it is also unsanitary and possibly hazardous.

Deja Vu?By Ginnie Drew

Ever since it started, sometime in late 2019 or early 2020, depending on who you ask, the current Covid-19 pandemic has been compared to the flu out-

break in 1918.

I am going to shed some light on exactly what the 1918 pandemic was and how it compares with the current pandemic.

The 1918 pandemic was caused by a virus that, like the current one, was very easily transmitted by droplets and aerosol, which made mask-wearing important in its control. However, the virus itself (Influenza A Subtype H1N1) was totally unrelated to the current one (SARS-CoV-2). In fact, the coronavirus is not a flu virus, and is described as more like a viral pneumonia

It was called the Spanish flu, but the first recorded deaths were from the US, France, Germany, and the UK, not from Spain. The misinformation occurred because it started during WWI, when Spain was neutral and did not censor their press, as did the other countries. Therefore, people first heard about it from Spanish newspapers and assumed it originated there.

The 1918 pandemic came in 3 waves. The first, mainly in Europe, started in March, 1918. It waned during the summer, but in October came the second wave. This was the one which caused the most deaths in the US. It was pretty much over by December, but in January, 1919, a third wave started in Australia and moved to Europe and the US.

The virus never actually disappeared, but a collective immunity developed by 1920.

There is no accurate count of the death toll from that virus, but estimates range from 17 to 50 million people worldwide, with some estimates topping at 100 million. It is estimated that one third of the population was infected. In the US, deaths were estimated at 675,000.

Things were much different back then.

One cause of death from the virus is through secondary bacterial infections. Today we have antibiotics to treat them. At that time there were none. One of the main treatments for the 1918 flu was high doses of aspirin. Doctors were prescribing up to 30 grams daily, which we now know is toxic... doses above 4 grams are considered unsafe. So, it is believed that many of the deaths attributed to the flu were actually caused by aspirin poisoning.

They didn't have the sophisticated ICUs that we have now, with ventilators and other technology which we take for granted today.

They didn't have any vaccine, nor the ability to develop one. The first flu vaccine was approved in the US in the 1940's.

The world was embroiled in a war. The close quarters found in barracks led to easy spread of the virus, and troops moved from country to country, spreading the virus even more. Some say that more troops died from the virus than from battle.

Standards of hygiene were much lower at that time. But, the same advice re stopping the spread of the virus was much the same... wear a mask, wash your hands, keep your distance from others.

One way in which the 2 viruses are alike is that they are both "novel." Which means that they are so different from any previous viruses that no one had any immunity to them. One difference is in the demographics affected. The 1918 virus affected mostly healthy people between the ages of 20 and 40, as well as those under 5 and over 65. The current virus affects mainly those over 65 with underlying health conditions.

There have been other pandemics in the past 100 years:

In 1956 - 1958 there was the Asian flu, which killed 2 million people worldwide and 60,000 to 70,000 in the US. The fact that they now had the ability to produce vaccines helped lower the mortality rate.

In 1968 there was another flu pandemic (H3N2 as opposed to H1N1 in 1918). About 1 million people worldwide and 33,000 people in the US died from that virus. The ability to create a vaccine and the better reporting and tracking were credited with lowering the mortality rate for that pandemic.

HIV pandemic: HIV was originally reported in 1976 in Central Africa, and was first recognized globally in 1981. An estimated 36 million people have died from this virus since then. The death rate has dropped significantly in recent years due to new therapies. In 2014, 7.8 million people died from the virus and in 2018 it was reduced to 770,000. So it seems like the viruses keep coming, but we are better and better able to isolate, track and treat them as time goes on. Even without any vaccine we developed "herd immunity" from the 1918 virus within 2 years. So, we all have to keep doing what is necessary to protect ourselves and our loved ones, and pretty soon this will all be a bad memory... (Thanks to Marcia Napolitan for suggesting this article.)


