





THE TW BOOK CLUB

After taking a December break, the Book Club will resume on Thursday, January 21, at 3:00 pm in the Clubhouse Cardroom. We will discuss All The Light We Cannot See by Anthony Doerr. This book has been on the best seller list for 90 weeks; it is a beautifully crafted book. The story takes place during World War II in Germany and France. The primary characters are Werner, a German orphan, and Marie-Laure, a blind Parisian girl. Yvonne DuPont will be our facilitator. Then on February 18 at 3:00 pm, Dabbie Erikson will lead the discussion on The Orphan Train by Christina Baker Kline. This book is based on the true story of American orphans who were loaded on trains from cities on the East Coast and transported to the Midwest between the years of 1854 and 1929. The orphans were then offered up for adoption—many as farm workers or housekeepers. This is a very eye-opening and inspirational book. Quite a few members of the club attended a lecture/slide show presentation by Ms. Kline which took place in Venice last year. Next, on March 17, Linda Schultz will be our facilitator for The Zookeeper's Wife by Diane Ackerman. You are in for a very interesting read on this one; it is based on historical diaries and other historical sources. Jan and Antonina Zabinski were Polish Christian zookeepers, and they were horrified by the Nazis. The Zabinskis were able to hide many of the zoo animals and Resistance activists and refugee Jews in the zoo's cages, many of whom Jan had smuggled from the Warsaw Ghetto. The author has previously written of the natural world, and she again explores the role of nature in both kindness and savagery. Our final book discussion will be on April 21 at 3:00 pm. We will select April's book at a later date.



NEW FAST WALKING EXERCISE GROUP

His test results are improved, his balance is improved, he looks great and he feels great. What keeps his exercise program going? He thinks exercise is "between the ears—a state of mind." Personally, I think here in Florida, Dick is slacking off. He is walking only seven to nine miles a day and taking part in many exercise classes in TW. But in Maine, he walked 10 1/4 miles a day! The mission of our committee is to preserve and encourage the use of our "Nature Trail" and adjacent property. We educate homeowners, do research on native plants, encourage use of native plants in landscaping and removal of invasive plants. Our trail is a "Tropical Hardwood Hammock." These are areas of dense vegetation including hardwood trees and shrubs, palms, ferns and epiphytes. The predominant trees are live oak, mahogany, strangler fig, slash pine and cabbage palms. We grow the strangler fig, bromeliads and air plants. We intend to be good stewards of our trail and protect this area.. Soon, we will be installing an info board to post photos of plants you will see on the trail, plus upcoming educational programs. We will be announcing-monthly workdays too. Please do not plant anything on the trail before talking to us first. They crowd out the native plants. Contact me at 317-331-7778 with any questions.



A MEMORY QUILT FOR DAVID

Finally done—what a good feeling! My nephew, David, will be pleased. As I look at the finished quilt, I remember how close he and

his mother were. They had a special bond.

A year ago, as I sorted through a box of fabric from my late sister's sewing room, I came across quilt pieces that had uneven edges or were shorter than others. This struck me as strange because my sister, Charlotte, was a perfectionist. She was a teacher of the visually impaired; she loved her students. So it was not like her to cut uneven quilt pieces.

A call to David confirmed my thoughts that he would like a quilt made from fabric his mom had cut, probably sometime during a regimen of chemotherapy when her hands shook, vision was cloudy or balance was unsteady. On days when she felt weak, she worked on a small counted cross-stitch—maybe a mini-quilt pattern or a bookmark. These were easy to handle and helped to pass the time.

Well, as I began organizing the pieces, a Roman Square pattern developed. Yeah, my sister would like this and be proud of me. Now I needed to think about the back of the quilt. As I searched through Charlotte's stash of fabric, I found a piece printed in a colorful array of multi-cultural children. Then there appeared a nice piece with mini-cupcakes on it. Oh yes, the Yankee baseball logo! David is from New York, maybe he'll like this even if he is not a fan. Then there appeared skiers on a snowy slope—David used to ski. More and more fabric was found—John Deere hats, chili peppers, multi-sports patterns and musical instruments. Wow, all these fabrics which have a connection to David's life and his mom. To my surprise, in a small box I found mini-quilts in counted cross-stitch. My mind went crazy! Oh my, there is a bookmark with birds and stitched words that said, "Save a Place for Wild Life." How could this be—no one could have planned it that David had bought a wooded lot and built a cabin for year-round escape with the inheritance money from his mom. Perfect to put this bookmark on a plain fabric.

As the quilt and memories blended together, I found comfort in creating an item to warm one's heart and soul. Then at the bottom of a small box, I found an eight-inch square of counted cross-stitch flowers framed in a green border with Charlotte's initials-CRD 1999. I handstitched Charlotte's cross-stitched squares onto the back of David's quilt. The quilt, created in loving memory of my sister Charlotte, will be shipped for Christmas to David, Charlotte's son.

OUR OWN CENTENARIAN



George Taylor achieved his 101st birthday on December 23, 2015. As anyone can imagine, his activity level has decreased, not so much by age as due to a fall in May. He tells us that someone came to his door and knocked, and when he called out for the person to enter, the accident occurred. He was sitting in his reclining, rotating chair, started to get up, sat on the arm of the chair, and the chair either turned or he just slipped off, breaking his hip. The person at the door is still unknown, and George thinks it may have been someone up to no good. His daughter, Nancy, has taken charge of his care, hired help, and set up his home for his ease and comfort. He has four lovely private duty nurses who take shifts seeing to his every need. They say he is an awesome patient, witty, entertaining, sharp as a tack, and so very determined to walk again.

George and his wife came to Florida in 1965 to visit a daughter and son-in-law in Pompano Beach. They didn't care for that area of Florida, but liked the state and sought out a place they could call home. Englewood became that home. They first rented until 1977, and then George built the first of two homes they lived in, one in Englewood Gardens and one on Broadway. He lost his wife and the big home and garden property became overwhelming. He found TW in 1986 and he says, "I like it here, the folks own the land, and they keep up their property." That is high praise from a former builder.

George was a prolific builder of homes, restaurants, garages, laundromats, fire halls, and even car washes in his hometown of Buffalo, NY. George also designed and built Myakka Pines Golf Course. His golf course had 27 holes, a restaurant and a pro shop. There were 440 members with a growing waiting list when he sold out to the members after just six months.

For the time being, George is slowly working towards recovery and looks forward to resuming a more active pace. The day I visited with him, this wonderfully engaging gentleman had just taken his first steps with a walker. He will be having rehab a couple of times a week, and perhaps soon we will see him out for a stroll in the sunshine for which Florida is so famous. In the meantime, his daughter and friends visit, but I am sure that he would love a visit from those of you who may have known him during his almost 30 years living among us.






