## THE WHATS AND WHYS OF LEAP YEAR

As we all probably know, every 4 years (including 2020), we add an extra day to the year—February 29. Whether this is a good thing or not depends on your own perspective. If you are up north, February, with its cold, dreary, icy days is probably the worst month of the year, and you are eager to get it over with ASAP. If you are on a salary, you have to work an extra day for free. If you are paying a mortgage, you get an extra day for free. If you are a prisoner, you have to stay in jail for an extra day. If it's your birthday, it only comes around every 4 years. And on and on.

The first leap days were added to the Julian Calendar, which was started by Julius Caesar in 45 BC. The reason for this was that the actual solar year consists of approximately 365 1/4 days (365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 45 seconds, to be exact). So they added an extra day every 4 years to stay in sync with the seasons.

But, the year isn't exactly 365 1/4 days, so even this fine-tuning wasn't fine enough. By the 16th century the Julian calendar was lagging the solar year by 10 days. In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII ordered the advancement of the calendar by 10 days and added a refinement which said that century years were only to have a leap year if their number was divisible by 400. So, for example, the year 2000 was a leap year, but the year 2100 will not be. This new calendar was called the Gregorian calendar, and is the one that we use today.

However, nothing goes smoothly, and the same is true with calendar adoption. Many Protestant countries resisted the new calendar (maybe because it was developed by a pope?), which meant that they were getting farther and farther behind the ones that did. In England, for example, the Gregorian calendar wasn't adopted until September 2, 1752. On that day it was Sept. 2 in England, but Sept. 13 in Paris. So, they got themselves synched by declaring that the day after Wednesday, Sept. 2 would be Thursday, Sept. 14.



Other laggards included Germany and the Netherlands, which adopted it in 1698, Russia, which converted in 1918, and Greece, which waited until 1923 to follow suit. Currently, many Orthodox churches still follow the Julian calendar, which now lags by 13 days.

The reason the leap day was added to February instead of December is that the start of the year for the Julian Calendar was March 1. The original Julian calendar only had 10 months, which started in March and ended in December. The part of the year that is now January and February were undefined. Those days were useless to the Romans because their year revolved around harvest, and the important part of the year stretched from the beginning of March to the end of December. They did eventually add in the 2 months at the end of the year, with the last day of the year on February 28. So the leap day was added on to the end of their year.

Some interesting facts about leap day:

- Role Reversal: Women were encouraged to pop the question on leap day.
- Leap Year babies: There is a 1 in 1,461 chance of being born on Feb 29 (more significant than you might think).
- Leap Year babies are called Leaplings, and there are currently about 4 million of them out there.
- In Greece it is considered bad luck to get married in a leap year.
- Anthony, Texas is the self-proclaimed "Leap Year Capital of the World." It holds a festival which includes a guided trip to Aztec Cave, "fun at the horse farm" and square dancing.
- In Taiwan, married daughters traditionally return home during the leap month as it is believed the lunar month can bring bad health to parents. The daughters are told to bring pig trotter noodles to wish them good health and good fortune.

Probably more than you would want to know, but Happy Leap Year to all!

## ANIMAL LOVER

Retirement, and all of a sudden the world opens to untold opportunities. How will you spend that gift of freedom? Diane Laderoute wanted to do something different, something active. Her copy of the SUN had an article about a wildlife rescue and rehabilitation center in Venice. They needed volunteers and being an animal lover, Diane found the perfect fit. The center accepts

injured animals, heals those that they can, rehabilitates and then releases them back into their original habitat. The work is not all fun and games. There are cages to clean, floors to sweep and animals to feed. She has been doing this work for 5 years and has had many interesting experiences. She has rescued or assisted in rescuing eagles, tortoises, turtles, cormorants, loons and other birds and critters. Three years ago, around Christmas, she, Shirley Giff and two guys with a red truck used a blanket, a fishing net, and grill gloves to rescue a bird from a pasture. The rescue took about 45 minutes and the bird was actively resisting their help. She has rescued several animals while enjoying kayaking. One such rescue featured a great blue heron that required the help of another kayaker. Also, while kayaking with friends, they happened upon a manatee. The manatee focused on the blue kayak and began pushing it around. Can you imagine the excitement of interacting with a manatee? A pelican caught by fishing line in a mangrove in Englewood Isles survived with Diane's help. One unusual rescue was of a catbird that a woman had picked up and put in her car that found its way up under her dashboard. On an Easter Sunday, a white dove that had been in a wedding dove release ate something that made it sick and got well with her help. The coincidence of the bird being a white dove and it being Easter made the incident stick in her memory. Once she rescued a possum hit by a car and during the transport the animal was joined by 7 babies. That was some surprise. Diane leaves Florida in May and heads back to Connecticut where she works in an aquarium. There, she's had many interesting experiences. The worst thing she has to do there is grind up worms and smelts for the sea life that prefer that food. She spent a couple of years doing the preparation of the food for the tanks. She has cleaned the tanks and watched as rescued beached seals were released. Diane has petted a penguin and a stingray and fed an electric eel. She captured jelly fish for display at Long Island Sound. She has had a manicure by peppermint shrimp who liked to clean the organisms from your hands. She was bitten on a finger by a puffer fish. They like shrimp and if you are slow to feed them they jump up to take it from your hand. The bite caused her to lose a fingernail for a while. She has painted a picture with a Whale. Being an avid photographer, she photographed that painting and had it reproduced on canvas. That painting is displayed proudly in her TW home. You should see her other very professional photos of birds and shore life. Like I said, Diane really loves animals.


