Critters Among Us

Most of us know that we are living in an area that is also home to a great many animals. Most of them are fairly harmless to humans. As a matter of fact, our animal neighbors that might view us as food have a good supply of food that they prefer. And if we realize this or not, they view us as predators. Our bobcats, wild pigs, wild turkeys, and birds of every description do not present a problem for us as humans. The exception is the alligators among us. Most of them are not a problem, very few of them are considered "aggressive." This means that they pose a threat to us,

our pets, livestock or property. Recently, an "aggressive" alligator had to be removed from Lake 3. The Florida Wildlife Commission was contacted and they in turn contacted an authorized trapper. The reason this happened was because this alligator had chewed the aerator hoses in the lake, not once but several times. Replacing these parts is not inexpensive and our dues pay for their replacement. This alligator was captured and removed from our property. The trapper who bravely captured and removed it told some bystanders harrowing stories of his experiences. This trapper related information about 350 captures a year. According to the Florida Wildlife Commission, removed alligators usually try to return to the areas where they were captured causing additional problems. If relocated, they also do not integrate well into existing alligator populations. Some of us feel some sense of sadness at the loss of a wild critter but should accept the necessity for it. We should accept responsibility for some of this happening. Because we wish to live on the water or in areas formerly occupied only by them and their prey, we bear most of the blame for their destruction.
