



.CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

When I was asked to do a piece about Christmas traditions in the U.S. I had no idea of the variety of ways people celebrate this holiday. I tried to pare down the list to bring some examples of how regional differences lead to variations in the Christmas theme.

Festival of Trees: The people of Boise, ID bring the spirit of Christmas giving to life with the annual Festival of Trees. Organizations and individuals purchase and decorate trees, with all proceeds going to charity. They then gather for a black-tie gala to vote on who decorated their tree the best.

Christmas Bird Census: This is a tradition in which our family participated when I was growing up. It was started by Frank Chapman, who was an officer in the fledgling Audubon Society, in 1900. Every Christmas people go out and count birds in their area and send the results in to the Audubon Society. This was started as an alternative for the then-popular Christmas Bird Hunt. Last year about 77,000 people across the U.S. participated.

Christmas Bonfires: Every Christmas Eve, people build massive bonfires along the banks of the Mississippi River between New Orleans and Baton Rouge. This is done to light the way for Papa Noel (the Cajun term for Santa Claus).

Boat Parades: California has its own idea of a good Christmas parade...boats instead of floats. There's Santa Barbara's Parade of Lights, the Lighted Boat Parade of Fisherman's Wharf, and the San Pedro Holiday Afloat Lighted Boat Parade, among others.

Elfpalooza: In Mobile, Alabama residents don't dress as Santa. They don the outfits of Santa's elves, and congregate in the Mobile Convention Center for the annual Elfpalooza. They watch "Elf" and enjoy hot chocolate, beer and wine and try to beat the Guinness record for "most Santa's elves in a single location".

Farolitos in Santa Fe: Along Canyon Road, which is lined with historic adobe houses, residents set out "farolitos" (small, sand-filled paper bags illuminated with votive candles), creating an inviting stroll for visitors. Hmmm... sound familiar?

Gingerbread House Competition: In Reno, NV the May Arboretum Society hosts a gingerbread competition, where architects of all ages compete in several categories. The houses must be at least 75% edible materials and battery-operated lights are acceptable.

Sandi: In West Palm Beach they have a more tropical tradition. "Sandi" is a 35 ft tall, 700-pound tree made from sand. It takes about a month to create and is left on display for about 3 weeks, during which time they have other holiday activities, including nightly light shows, a featured band and strolling a Capella singers.

Tumbleweed Tree: In Chandler, AZ they have another non-traditional Christmas tree, made out of an estimated 1,000 tumbleweed bushes. The tree has a white non-flammable covering to prevent a massive fireball and is illuminated with colorful lights.

Pig Roast: In Hawaii the traditional Christmas dinner is a pig roast. This dates back to the first known Christmas which was celebrated on Dec. 25, 1786. A merchant ship, the Queen Charlotte, docked off the coast of Malakai and sent a search party ashore. They killed a pig and roasted it. The sailors made their own version of a pina colada by taking their rum and mixing it with the milk of coconuts from the island. They also exchanged gifts with the natives.

Miracle on 34th Street: In Baltimore, Maryland, over 70 years ago, a man living on 34th Street decorated a tree in his front yard. In succeeding years, more and more of his neighbors followed suit until every house on the block was transformed into a spectacle called the "Miracle on 34th Street." They draw visitors from around the country to enjoy the decorations.

Lutefisk: A favorite Christmas dish in Minnesota, with its large Scandinavian population, is Lutefisk. It is a white fish which is soaked in water for several days and then treated with lye, giving it a Jello-like consistency similar to Gefiltefish. I think I will stick with turkey and dressing!

Decorating with "Ristras": In New Mexico they decorate with dried chili peppers (ristras) instead of evergreens, stringing them or using them to make wreaths.

The Keg Tree: Rochester NY, home of Genesee Brewing Company, they create an annual "keg tree." In 2017 they created the largest to date, composed of 430 kegs and covered in 2,000 feet of lights.

Christmas Guns: At Fort Reno, OK, the firing of Christmas Guns (and cannons) is a tradition brought by German Immigrants. It is said to dispel evil spirits in preparation for Christmas.

Singing Christmas Tree: In Portland, OR, they have a real Singing Christmas Tree. The tradition entered its 55th season this year and featured 350 singers that were set in rows that looked like a Christmas tree. The 2-hour performance includes dancing, a nativity scene and a light show.

The Christmas Camel: In 1787 George Washington brought a camel to his home in Mount Vernon, VA. This has developed into a tradition where the town has its own Christmas Camel every year.

Like I said, this is just a sampling of the myriad of ways people in this country celebrate Christmas. I hope you and yours have a very happy and blessed holiday.


